The **FALL 2019** enrollment of **24,126** on the Springfield campus was the third highest headcount in Bear history.

For national comparison purposes, the headcount of **23,453** is used. It is based on IPEDS submissions and is represented on subsequent charts and tables. This total does not include the **673** students exclusively auditing classes, enrolled at English Language Institute (ELI), China Campus or Study Away. These data are used for all external surveys.



Total Bear enrollment has increased by 3,135 (15.4%) in the last 11 years.





**Other Specialty Land of 53 acres is Bull Shoals Field Station and Baker Observatory. Physical changes continue on the Springfield campus:

- An addition to McQueary Family Health Sciences Hall will include 240-seat tiered classroom, one 75-seat tiered classroom, 4 faculty offices, restrooms, and storage space. The work also includes modifications to the existing building to accommodate new corridor connections and reconfiguration of parking spaces. The project will be complete prior to the fall 2020.
- Construction of an approximately 21,000 square foot addition to Greenwood Laboratory School will be completed for fall 2020. The addition will include a new south entrance, an adjacent office, a lobby supporting the school, restrooms and a multi-purpose center capable of seating 750 people with a performance stage. The new space will provide a larger, accessible entrance and a welcome center.
- Phase II Cooperative Engineering Expansion and the eFactory Business Incubator expansion will infill a portion of the second floor of **Robert** W. Plaster Center for Free Enterprise for fall 2020. The Cooperative Engineering expansion work will include additional design and research labs, distance learning classrooms, and tutoring rooms. The eFactory expansion work will include 8 additional business incubator spaces, a conference room, and a large training area that can be sub-divided.
- Completion of Woods House Phase II renovations reconfigured bathrooms and provided new finishes on the first and tenth floors. A new developer-led residence hall at the corner of Madison Street and Holland Avenue is expected to open to the campus residential community in fall 2020.
