



PEACE CORPS PREP STUDENT GUIDE

The Peace Corps Prep program at **Missouri State University** will prepare you for international development fieldwork and potential Peace Corps service. To accomplish this, you will build **4 core competencies** through interrelated coursework, hands-on experience, and professional development support, and complete **1 additional requirement**.

The 4 competencies and associated requirements are as follows:

1. Training & Experience in 1 of 6 work sectors (Pages 3-9)

- 3 courses related to your chosen work sector
- 50 hours of related work experience (community activity, study away)

2. Intercultural Competence (Pages 10-11)

- 3 approved courses **OR**
- 1-2 approved courses, plus substantive intercultural experience

3. Professional Development and Leadership (Page 12)

- Resume preparation and evaluation at Career Center
- Interview preparation and practice at Career Center
- Demonstration of Leadership Activities **OR**
- Take **Sociology 492: Leadership and Professional Development**

4. Foreign Language Skills (Page 13)

- Peace Corps' language requirements vary by region
- At MSU, Peace Corps Prep strongly recommends completing two language courses
- Arabic, French, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, Swahili are taught at MSU

5. Familiarize Yourself with Peace Corps Service (Page 14)

- Meet with PC Prep Committee member for initial discussion about program **OR**
- Attend one Missouri State Peace Corps Prep Event (an event is held every fall and spring semester)
- **Recommended:** Meet with PCP Program Coordinator or committee member each semester

- ❑ PC Prep is open to ALL undergraduate students, from all programs, colleges, and disciplines. Students must have a minimum cumulative 2.0 GPA.
- ❑ Starting in your freshman year at Missouri State, you can enroll in the PC Prep program
- ❑ PC Prep has a rolling admission, so apply any time throughout the academic year
- ❑ We will work with you to achieve your goals and earn a Peace Corps Prep certificate
- ❑ **Before beginning your PC Prep courses and activities, meet with a member of the Peace Corps Prep Committee!!**

Education Abroad and Peace Corps Prep

- Peace Corps Prep certificate participants interested in Education Abroad should look for a program with content that matches their sector interest, future goals, and builds skill in research.
- Depending on program content and duration, **a single Education Abroad program may be able to fulfill multiple Peace Corps Prep requirements**, including one work sector course, some or all of the work sector field experience hours, and up to two of the Intercultural Competence course requirements.
 - You may be asked to provide a syllabus and/or other documentation of the Education Abroad course content.
- To count towards certificate requirements, Education Abroad programs or volunteer experiences must be in a country that has at some point hosted Peace Corps volunteers. 1. Training and Experience in a Specific Work Sector

3 courses + 50 hours related experience

Leveraging concrete knowledge and skills is central to on-the-ground international development work. Through this PC Prep program, you will begin to build a professional specialty, which should serve your career well whether you become a Peace Corps Volunteer or not.

For PC Prep, you need to complete at least **3 courses** that align with a specific work sector (they can but do not need to come from your academic major or minor). You also must accumulate a **minimum of 50 hours of volunteer or work experience in that same sector**, preferably in a teaching or outreach capacity.

Peace Corps Tip! *If you intend to apply to the Peace Corps, the best way to assure that you will be a strong candidate is to explore Peace Corps' openings and identify the [type of assignments](#) (www.peacecorps.gov/volunteer/volunteer-openings) in which you'd like to serve, then review the positions' required and desired qualifications and build them up accordingly. In the process, you should fulfill these PC Prep experiential requirements!*

There are [six sectors](#) (www.peacecorps.gov/volunteer/what-volunteers-do/) in which Peace Corps Volunteers serve—detailed in the following pages. **Choose one sector to focus on** then complete at least 3 courses + 50 hours of related experience in that sector.

Note: Actual Peace Corps assignments are based on local needs, and thus may or may not align seamlessly with your qualifications. Flexibility is central to the Peace Corps experience!

EDUCATION

Teach lessons that last a lifetime. Education is the Peace Corp's largest program area. Volunteers play an important role in creating links among schools, parents, and communities by working in elementary, secondary, and postsecondary schools as math, science, conversational English, and resource teachers or as early grade reading and literacy teacher trainers. Volunteers also develop libraries and technology resource centers.

If you choose Education, take 3 courses from one of the following areas:

Build 50 hours of related field experience through activities such as:

- ❑ Completing **CFD 303: Service-Learning: Child and Family Development** or other related Service-Learning courses (which include 40 hours of service)
 - ❑ Teaching in one of these or a similar form: in a classroom, with a community outreach organization (e.g., Ozarks Literacy Council), or in a formal tutoring capacity. E.g., teaching immigrants/refugees in a community organization, e.g., International Institute of Southwest Missouri
 - The subject of the teaching may be English as a Foreign/Second Language, special education, drama, or a STEM subject
 - ❑ Participating in a related Missouri State 'Bear Breaks' Immersion Trip (~40 hours offered during spring break)
 - ❑ Education Abroad with teaching component or activities within public schools, where you are assisting with student learning (preferably in a current or past Peace Corps country)

HEALTH

Serve on the front lines of global health. Health Volunteers work within their communities to promote important topics such as nutrition, maternal and child health, basic hygiene, and water sanitation. Volunteers also work in HIV/AIDS education and prevention programs to train youth as peer educators, develop appropriate education strategies, provide support to children orphaned by the pandemic, and create programs that provide emotional and financial support to families and communities affected by the disease.

If you choose Health, take 3 courses from one of the following areas:

- Volunteer or work experience in such areas as HIV/AIDS outreach, hospice, family planning counseling, emergency medical technician (EMT) or CPR teaching/certification, maternal health, and hands-on caregiving in a hospital, clinic, or lab technician setting
- Counseling or teaching in health subjects
- Working as a resident advisor in a dormitory, as a peer nutritionist, or as a sexually transmitted infections counselor
- Significant experience in mechanical repairs, construction, carpentry, masonry, plumbing, hydrology, or set design

ENVIRONMENT

Help forge a global movement to protect our planet. Volunteers lead grassroots efforts in their communities to protect the environment and strengthen understanding of environmental issues. They teach environmental awareness in elementary and secondary schools and to youth groups and community organizations, empowering communities to make their own decisions about how to protect and conserve the local environment. Volunteers also address environmental degradation by promoting sustainable use of natural resources.

AGRICULTURE

Lead grassroots efforts to fight hunger in a changing world. Agricultural Volunteers work with small-scale farmers and families to increase food security and production and adapt to climate change while promoting environmental conservation practices. They introduce farmers to techniques that prevent soil erosion, reduce the use of harmful pesticides, and replenish the soil. They work alongside farmers on integrated projects that often combine vegetable gardening, livestock management, agroforestry, and nutrition education.

Empower the next generation of change makers. Volunteers work with youth in communities on projects that promote engagement and active citizenship, including gender awareness, employability, health and HIV/AIDS education, environmental awareness, sporting programs, and info technology.

COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Harness 21st-century tools to help communities lift themselves. Volunteers work with development banks, nongovernmental organizations, and municipalities to strengthen infrastructure and encourage economic opportunities in communities. They frequently teach in classroom settings and work with entrepreneurs and business owners to develop and market their products. Some Volunteers also teach basic computer skills and help communities take advantage of technologies such as e-commerce, distance learning, and more.

If you choose Community Economic Development, take three courses from one of the following areas:

2. Intercultural Competence

3 approved courses *or* 1-2 courses + substantive intercultural experience

Engaging thoughtfully and fluidly across cultures begins with one's own self-awareness. With this learning objective, you will deepen your cultural 'agility' through **a mix of three introspective courses/electives** in which you learn about others while reflecting upon your own life. You will learn *cultural relativism*. The goal is for you to build your capacity to shift perspective and behavior around relevant cultural differences.

You'll take at least **1 core course** in Diversity and Inclusion AND either:

- **2 additional courses** (from the core courses list or the electives list)
OR
- **1 additional course** (from the core courses list or the electives list) and complete an ***Education Abroad** program (or volunteer experience in another country) for 1 to 12 weeks
OR
- complete a **semester-long *Education Abroad program** (or volunteer experience in another country)

* Note that the Education Abroad program or volunteer experience must be in a country that has at some point hosted Peace Corps volunteers. Check out the list of current and past Peace Corps countries (www.peacecorps.gov/countries) to confirm.

- If you need to find a sector-related project or should you decide to do a ‘substantive intercultural experience’ in the local community, consider taking ANT 400: *Action Anthropology*. Tell the professor that you are part of *Peace Corps Prep* and want to find an action activity to fulfill these hours and requirements. Remember to speak with a member of the Peace Corps Prep committee to ensure that your activity counts toward the certificate requirements.

Peace Corps Tip!

Prolonged intercultural experiences—such as studying or volunteering abroad, supporting new immigrants or refugees acculturate to the United States, or volunteering in diverse schools—can strengthen your Peace Corps candidacy significantly.

3. Professional and Leadership Development

Resume and interview support + Leadership experience

Peace Corps service and similar international development work opportunities are highly professional and selective. PC Prep requires **3 specific activities** that will strengthen your candidacy for the Peace Corps (or any other professional endeavor):

1. **RESUME:** Have your resume reviewed by someone in the Career Center at Missouri State University
 - Upload your resume to **Handshake**
 - Visit the Career Center Drop-in Hours in Carrington 309 (See Career Center Website for hours)
 - Schedule an appointment with a Career Resources Specialist by calling 417-836-5636 or through Handshake
2. **INTERVIEW SKILLS:** Practice your interview skills with the Missouri State Career Center
 - Schedule a mock interview with a Career Resources Specialist by calling 417-836-5636 or through Handshake.
 - Access Big Interview from the Career Center webpage for an online AI-guided interview with feedback
3. Develop at least one significant **LEADERSHIP EXPERIENCE** and be prepared to discuss it thoughtfully. For example, you could participate in Model UN or one of the following leadership programs: Commerce Bank Emerging Leaders, Peer Leaders, Bonner Leaders, Distinction in Public Affairs, or Inclusive Excellence Scholarship. Other examples include organizing a campus event, leading a service, work or volunteer project, or serving on the executive board of a student organization.

Note: You can complete the following course to fulfill all three professional and leadership development requirements:

SOC 492 Leadership and Professional Development

Course will cover resume and interview requirements, including work with the Missouri State Career Center, and will include guidance and support for locating and completing a leadership experience.

4. Foreign Language Skills

Requirements vary by placement region

The skills that you will need to work in another country, and within a different culture or cultures, include both verbal and non-verbal language and communication. Most students must hone their capacity to interact professionally using a non-English language. *Minimum course requirements vary by desired placement region.*

- ❑ *Latin America*: Students indicating an intention to serve as a Peace Corps volunteer in Spanish-speaking countries must build strong intermediate proficiency, by completing two 200-level courses, or learning Spanish through another medium.
- ❑ *West Africa*: Students indicating an intention to serve as a Peace Corps Volunteer in French-speaking African countries must build proficiency in French or another Romance language, by completing one 200-level course or learning the language through another medium.
- ❑ *Everywhere else*: Students indicating an intention to serve as a Peace Corps Volunteer anywhere else do not have explicit language requirements to complete the Peace Corps Prep Program, but are encouraged to study a foreign language, which will show your aptitude for learning another language.

In summary, although Peace Corps does not have specific language requirements for all volunteer placement sites, to fulfill this requirement for the PC Prep certificate at Missouri State University, and serve in a Spanish or French-speaking country, you should complete two language courses (at least 200-level or higher courses), if you are studying Spanish, and one 200-level course if you are studying French.

Notes:

- If you speak two or more languages and can demonstrate that you speak them with proficiency, you can skip this requirement! We will need to note this in your final paperwork/exit checklist.
- If you have already taken and passed foreign language courses, or tested out of language requirements for Missouri State, these courses or tests will fulfill this requirement for the Peace Corps Prep certificate.

Meet with and interview Returned Peace Corps Volunteer or participate in a Missouri State PC Prep Event
