



PEACE CORPS PREP STUDENT GUIDE

The Peace Corps Prep program at **Missouri State University** will prepare you for international development fieldwork and potential Peace Corps service. To accomplish this, you will build **4 core competencies** through interrelated coursework, hands-on experience, and professional development support, and complete **1 additional requirement**.

The 4 competencies and associated requirements are as follows:

- 1. Training & Experience in 1 of 6 work sectors (Pages 3-9)
- ➤ 3 courses related to your chosen work sector
- > 50 hours of related work experience (community activity, study away)
- 2. Intercultural Competence (Pages 10-11)
- ➤ 3 approved courses **OR**
- ➤ 1-2 approved courses, plus substantive intercultural experience
- 3. Professional Development and Leadership (Page 12)
- ➤ Resume preparation and evaluation at Career Center
- ➤ Interview preparation and practice at Career Center
- ➤ Demonstration of Leadership Activities **OR**
- > Take Sociology 492: Leadership and Professional Development

- ➤ Peace Corps' language requirements vary by region
- ➤ At MSU, Peace Corps Prep strongly recommends completing two language courses

Education Abroad and Peace Corps Prep

- Peace Corps Prep certificate participants interested in Education Abroad should look for a program with content that matches their sector interest, future goals, and builds skill in research.
- Depending on program content and duration, a single Education Abroad program may be able to fulfill multiple Peace Corps Prep requirements, including one work sector course, some or all of the work sector field experience hours, and up to two of the Intercultural Competence course requirements.
 - You may be asked to provide a syllabus and/or other documentation of the Education Abroad course content.
- To count towards certificate requirements, Education Abroad programs or volunteer experiences must be in a country that has at some point hosted Peace Corps volunteers. Check out the list of <u>current and past Peace Corps countries</u> (www.peacecorps.gov/countries) to confirm.
- Visit the <u>Office of Education Abroad's web page</u> (International.MissouriState.edu/EducationAbroad) to view upcoming Education Abroad programs.
- An Education Abroad program or experience is **not required** to earn a Peace Corps Prep certificate.

1. Training and Experience in a Specific Work Sector

3 courses + 50 hours related experience

Leveraging concrete knowledge and skills is central to on-the-ground international development work. Through this PC Prep program, you will begin to build a professional specialty, which should serve your career well whether you become a Peace Corps Volunteer or not.

For PC Prep, you need to complete at least **3 courses** that align with a specific work sector (they can but do not need to come from your academic major or minor). You also must accumulate **a minimum of 50 hours of volunteer or work experience in that** *same* sector, preferably in a teaching or outreach capacity.

Peace Corps Tip! If you intend to apply to the Peace Corps, the best way to assure that you will be a strong candidate is to explore Peace Corps' openings and identify the <u>type of assignments</u> (www.peacecorps.gov/volunteer/volunteer-openings) in which you'd like to serve, then review the positions' required and desired qualifications and build them up accordingly. In the process, you should fulfill these PC Prep experiential requirements!

There are <u>six sectors</u> (www.peacecorps.gov/volunteer/what-volunteers-do/) in which Peace Corps Volunteers serve—detailed in the following pages. **Choose one sector to focus on** then complete at least 3 courses + 50 hours of related experience in that sector.

Note: Actual Peace Corps assignments are based on local needs, and thus may or may not align seamlessly with your qualifications. Flexibility is central to the Peace Corps experience!

EDUCATION

Teach lessons that last a lifetime. Education is the Peace Corp's largest program area. Volunteers play an important role in creating links among schools, parents, and communities by working in elementary, secondary, and postsecondary schools as math, science, conversational English, and resource teachers or as early grade reading and literacy teacher trainers. Volunteers also develop libraries and technology resource centers.

HEALTH

Serve on the front lines of global health. Health Volunteers work within their communities to promote important topics such as nutrition, maternal and child health, basic hygiene, and water sanitation. Volunteers also work in HIV/AIDS education and prevention programs to train youth as peer educators, develop appropriate education strategies, provide support to children orphaned by the pandemic, and create programs that provide emotional and financial support to families and communities affected by the disease.

If you choose Health, take 3 courses from one of the following areas:

ENVIRONMENT

Help forge a global movement to protect our planet. Volunteers lead grassroots efforts in their communities to protect the environment and strengthen understanding of environmental issues. They teach environmental awareness in elementary and secondary schools and to youth groups and community organizations, empowering communities to make their own decisions about how to protect and conserve the local environment. Volunteers also address environmental degradation by promoting sustainable use of natural resources.

AGRICULTURE

Lead grassroots efforts to fight hunger in a changing world. Agricultural Volunteers work with small-scale farmers and families to increase food security and production and adapt to climate change while promoting environmental conservation practices. They introduce farmers to techniques that prevent soil erosion, reduce the use of harmful pesticides, and replenish the soil. They work alongside farmers on integrated projects that often combine vegetable gardening, livestock management, agroforestry, and nutrition education.

COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Harness 21st-century tools to help communities lift themselves. Volunteers work with development banks, nongovernmental organizations, and municipalities to strengthen infrastructure and encourage economic opportunities in communities. They frequently teach in classroom settings and work with entrepreneurs and business owners to develop and market their products. Some Volunteers also teach basic computer skills and help communities take advantage of technologies such as e-commerce, distance learning, and more.

If you choose Community Economic Development, take three courses from one of the following areas:

2. Intercultural Competence

3 approved courses or 1-2 courses + substantive intercultural experience

Engaging thoughtfully and fluidly across cultures begins with one's own self-awareness. With this learning objective, you will deepen your cultural 'agility' through **a mix of three introspective courses/electives** in which you learn about others while reflecting upon your own life. You will learn *cultural relativism*. The goal is for you to build your capacity to shift perspective and behavior around relevant cultural differences.

You'll take at least 1 core course in Diversity and Inclusion AND either:

- 2 additional courses (from the core courses list or the electives list)
 OR
- 1 additional course (from the core courses list or the electives list) and complete an *Education Abroad program (or volunteer experience in another country) for 1 to 12 weeks OR
- complete a semester-long *Education Abroad program (or volunteer experience in another country)
- * Note that the Education Abroad program or volunteer experience must be in a country that has at some point hosted Peace Corps volunteers. Check out the list of current and past Peace Corps countries (www.peacecorps.gov/countries) to confirm.

Peace Corps Tip!

Prolonged intercultural experiences—such as studying or volunteering abroad, supporting new immigrants or refugees acculturate to the United States, or volunteering in diverse schools—can strengthen your Peace Corps candidacy significantly.

3. Professional and Leadership Development

Resume and interview support + Leadership experience

Peace Corps service and similar international development work opportunities are highly professional and selective. PC Prep requires **3 specific activities** that will strengthen your candidacy for the Peace Corps (or any other professional endeavor):

- 1. **RESUME:** Have your resume reviewed by someone in the Career Center at Missouri State University
 - Upload your resume to Handshake
 - Visit the Career Center Drop-in Hours in Carrington 309 (See Career Center Website for hours)
 - Schedule an appointment with a Career Resources Specialist by calling 417-836-5636 or through Handshake
- 2. **INTERVIEW SKILLS:** Practice your interview skills with the Missouri State Career Center
 - Schedule a mock interview with a Career Resources Specialist by calling 417-836-5636 or through Handshake.
 - Access Big Interview from the Career Center webpage for an online AI-guided interview with feedback
- 3. Develop at least one significant **LEADERSHIP EXPERIENCE** and be prepared to discuss it thoughtfully. For example, you could participate in Model UN or one of the following leadership programs: Commerce Bank Emerging Leaders, Peer Leaders, Bonner Leaders, Distinction in Public Affairs, or Inclusive Excellence Scholarship. Other examples include organizing a campus event, leading a service, work or volunteer project, or serving on the executive board of a student organization.
